Our Narrative

New Living Translation John 6:5-14 Jesus Feeds the Five Thousand

5 Jesus soon saw a huge crowd of people coming to look for him. Turning to Philip, he asked, "Where can we buy bread to feed all these people?" **6** He was testing Philip, for he already knew what he was going to do.

7 Philip replied, "Even if we worked for months, we wouldn't have enough money^[a] to feed them!"

8 Then Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, spoke up. **9** "There's a young boy here with five barley loaves and two fish. But what good is that with this huge crowd?"

10 "Tell everyone to sit down," Jesus said. So they all sat down on the grassy slopes. 14 When the people saw him^[a] do this miraculous sign, they exclaimed, "Surely, he is the Prophet we have been expecting!"^[c]

Elham Church of England Primary School

Elham Church of England Primary School is a Church of England Voluntary Aided Primary School catering for children between the ages of 4 and 11 years. The school prides itself on being a church school with three specific values (respect, support and inspire) based on the fundamental beliefs in one God, Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit and the Anglican tradition.

Introduction

This policy complies with statutory regulations and the code of practice, and in cases of conflict, these regulations will apply.

As a Church of England Aided School, it is hoped that parents who wish their children to attend will be in sympathy with and participate in the Christian teaching provided.

Procedures

An annual Open Day takes place at the end of Term 2, and parents are invited to contact the school for further information. Parents are also invited, should they wish, to make an appointment to tour the school with the Headteacher to view and learn more about the school. We recommend that your child comes with you, so they can experience the school for themselves before the application is completed. Applications should be made directly to the local authority, and parents are to apply online at www.kent.gov.uk/ola

Pupils will be admitted to the Reception Year before their fifth birthday, usually entering at the start of the academic year (September 2025 to July 2026).

The Published Admissions Number (PAN) for the Reception Year in September 2025 is 20.

Oversubscription Criteria

Where the school is named in a child's Statement of Special Educational Needs or an Education Healthcare plan, the child will be admitted to the school. The Published Admission Number (20) will be reduced accordingly before others are considered for the remaining places available.

The School will offer places in accordance with the following criteria in this order:

- Looked After Children and previously Looked After Children – A looked after child is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school. A previously looked after child means such children who were adopted (or subject to child arrangements orders or special guardianship orders) immediately following having been looked after and those children who appear to the admission authority to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted. A child is regarded as having been in state care outside of England if they were in the care of or were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation, or any other provider of care whose sole or main purpose is to benefit society.

- Current family association. Sibling. Where a brother or sister is attending Elham Primary School at the time of entry and lives at the same address as when the sibling was admitted or has moved to a property within 2 miles of the school. If the older sibling is currently attending Elham Primary School in Year 6, you cannot claim a sibling link for the younger child, as the older child will be transferring to a secondary school in September.
- Health and Special Access Reasons – Medical, health, social and special access reasons will be applied in accordance with the school’s legal obligations, in particular those under the Equality Act 2010. Priority will be given to those children whose mental or physical impairment means they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Equally, this priority will apply to children whose parents/guardians’ physical or mental health or social needs mean they have a demonstrable and significant need to attend a particular school. Such claims must be supported by written evidence from a suitably qualified medical practitioner who can demonstrate a special connection between these needs and the particular school.
- Nearness of children's homes to school - we use the distance between the child’s permanent home address (defined in KCC’s annual admissions prospectus) and the school, measured in a straight line using the National Land and Property Gazetteer (NLPG) address point. Distances are measured from a point defined as within the child’s home to a point defined as within the school as specified by NLPG. The same address point on the school site is used for everybody. When we apply the distance criterion for the school, these straight-line measurements are used to determine how close each applicant’s address is to the school. Where applications are made from properties or abodes that are not registered to the NLPG, including new build properties, KCC may be required to use planning sites or other relevant co-ordinates. In exceptional circumstances where alternative co-ordinates are not available, measurements will be determined by a Senior Admissions Officer and confirmed by Head of Service.
- The nearness of children's homes to school - we use the distance between the child’s permanent home address and the school, measured in a straight line using the National Land and Property Gazetteer (NLPG) address point. Distances are measured from a point defined as within the child’s home to a point defined as within the school as specified by NLPG. The exact address point on the school site is used for everybody. When we apply the distance criterion for an oversubscribed Community or Voluntary Controlled school, these straight-line measurements determine how close each applicant’s address is to the school.

Parents will be advised of the school allocated to them by KCC. If parents have declined a place, they have the right to appeal against a decision to the LEA. This will then go to a School Admission Appeal panel.

Additional Information

Elham Church of England Primary School will follow the Local Authority procedures relating to waiting lists, appeals, and late applications; further details are available on the Local Authority website www.kent.gov.uk where parents can access the 'Admission to Primary Schools in Kent' booklet. A waiting list will be held in oversubscription criteria order. In accordance with the requirements of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998, the Governors will make arrangements for parents to appeal against the Governors' refusal to offer a place for their child in the school. The Headteacher will supply details of the procedure on request. This right does not apply if your child is refused admission for a place in a year group outside their normal age-appropriate group.

Tie Breaker

In the unlikely event that two or more children are unable to be separated and in all other ways have equal eligibility for the last available place at the school, the names will be allocated a number and drawn randomly. This process will be independently supervised.

Appeals/Waiting Lists

Parents have the right to appeal against the refusal of a place. If they are unhappy with the decision, they can appeal to an independent panel for a place. Please contact the LA for details about the appeals process.

Parental Right to Defer Entry

Every child is entitled to a full-time place in September following their fourth birthday. Parents have the right to defer their child's entry into the Reception year (until the term following their fifth birthday, but not beyond the beginning of the final term). Parents also have the right for their child to start part-time (until the term following their fifth birthday). Schools are obliged to facilitate this. The only restriction is that children must secure the offered place by starting school on the prescribed day following his or her fifth birthday (or on his or her fifth birthday if it falls on a prescribed day), but within the beginning of the final term. The prescribed days are 31 December, 31 March and 31 August. This means that children born between the 1 April and 31 August (also known as "summer born") must start school at the beginning of the April term if they wish to keep their offer. Where parents wish for their summer-born child to defer entry until the start of Year 1, they must refuse their offered place, which may be offered to a different child, and then reapply through the In Year process. These applications should be made during the last month of the Reception Year. If a parent chooses to defer their child's entry to school, the child remains entitled to a funded early education place of 15 hours a week for 38 weeks of the year until they are admitted to the school.
