

# Census 2021: Total population change between 2011 and 2021

## **Headlines**

- The 2021 Census shows the total population of England is 56,489,800. England's population grew by 3,477,300 people (6.6%) between the 2011 Census and 2021 Census.
- The South East region is the most populous region at 9,278,100. The population in the South East grew by 643,300 people between 2011 and 2021 which is equal to a 7.5% increase.
- Kent is the most populous county within the South East at 1,576,100. The population in Kent grew by 112,400 people between 2011 and 2021 which is equal to a 7.7% increase.
- The 2021 Census population for Medway Unitary Authority's is 279,800. This is up by 15,900 since 2011 which equates to a 6% increase.





### Introduction

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales at a specific point in time. A national census has been conducted every decade since 1801, except for 1941.

Census day was on 21<sup>st</sup> March 2021 and was the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones, or tablets.

Understanding the needs of the nation helps everyone from central government to organisations, such as councils and health authorities, plan and fund public services across England and Wales. Census outputs inform where millions of pounds of public funding will be spent on services like transport, education, and health – on cycle routes, schools, and dental surgeries.

Information from the census is also important in helping lots of other people and organisations do their work. Charities and voluntary organisations often use it as evidence to get funding. It helps businesses to understand their customers and, for example, decide where to open new shops. Plus, those doing research, like university students and people looking into their family history, use census data. It provides important information on population diversity, allowing organisations to know whether they are meeting their responsibilities and triggering action where necessary. The census included questions about sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there was a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," lain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said.

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools, and new transport routes. That is why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Results will be made available in stages with the initial figures for total population, presented here, being the first to be released on 28th June 2022.





All personal records from the Census forms will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

# **Total Population: National and Regional**

The 2021 Census shows the total population of England at 56,489,800. England's population grew by 3,477,300 people (6.6%) between the 2011 Census and 2021 Census.

The South East region is the most populous region at 9,278,100. The population in the South East grew by 643,300 people between 2011 and 2021, the highest increase in absolute terms of all the regions, equal to a 7.5% increase.

The highest regional percentage increase in population was in the East of England where the population grew by 487,500 or 8.3%

The North East has the smallest population at 2,647,100. This region also experienced the smallest increase in population between the 2001 and 2011 Census and the 2011 and 2021 Census.

# **Total Population in the South East**

#### **South East Counties**

NOTE: In this bulletin "Kent" refers to the Kent County Council area which excludes Medway

Kent is the most populous county within the South East at 1,576,100. The population in Kent grew by 112,400 people which is a 7.7% increase in percentage terms and is the largest increase in absolute (numbers) terms of all the counties in the region. The highest percentage increase in population was in Oxfordshire where the population grew by 71,500 or 10.9%.

East Sussex has the smallest population at 545,800. This county also experienced the smallest increase in population between the 2011 and 2021 Census. See Table 2 and Chart 2 for details.



# **South East Unitary Authorities**

Buckinghamshire is the most populous Unitary Authority within the South East at 553,100. Buckinghamshire saw the highest increase in absolute terms where the population rose by 47,800 between 2011 and 2021; a 9.5% increase.

Milton Keynes saw the highest percentage increase between 2011 and 2021 with 15.4% or 38,200 people.





Brighton & Hove, the Isle of Wight and Portsmouth are all showing modest increases between the 2011 and 2021 Census, of 1.4%-1.5%. See Table 3 and Chart 3 for details.



## **Kent Local Authorities**

In 2021 Maidstone was the most populous local authority within Kent at 175,800. Maidstone's population accounts for 11.2% of the total population of Kent.

Maidstone also experienced the highest increase in absolute terms in total population where the population rose by 20,600 between 2011 and 2021. This is the largest increase of all twelve local authorities in Kent and equates to a 13.3% increase.

Dartford saw the highest percentage total population increase with 19.9% or 19,400 people. Tunbridge Wells experienced the smallest increase in population between the 2011 and 2021 Census, rising by 300 people or a 0.3% increase.

Gravesham has the smallest population at 106,900 which accounts for 6.8% of the total population of Kent. See Table 4 and Charts 4 and 5 for details.


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Chart 4: Kent local authorities: population change between 2011 to 2021


Percentage total population change between 2011 and 2021 Census
