

Small Area Income Estimates 2017/18

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Further Information

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This bulletin presents the latest small area income estimates for areas in Kent and Medway. It presents total household income and net income before and after housing costs.

Summary

- Areas with the highest net income are largely concentrated to the west of Kent and Medway
- Eastern and coastal areas, and areas along the Thames Estuary have some of the lowest incomes
- The average total income in small areas in Kent & Medway ranged between £609 and £1,468 per week before outgoings such as income tax, national insurance, pension contributions and child maintenance are taken into account. After outgoings the net weekly income ranged between £470 and £981
- Equivalised income is adjusted to take into account household size and composition and can show income before and after housing costs
- After housing costs are taken into account the highest incomes are found largely in the west of Kent & Medway. Lowest incomes are found in coastal areas with some pockets around major urban areas.

Introduction

This bulletin looks at estimated household income for small areas (middle super output areas or MSOAs) in Kent and Medway.

These income estimates are produced by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) the latest available being for 2017/18.

ONS use survey data from the Family Resources Survey (FRS) to create small area income estimates. This is combined with information from the 2011 Census and administrative sources including:

- Department for Work and Pensions benefit claimant counts
- Valuation Office Agency Council Tax Bandings
- Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit
- Office for National Statistics, House Price Statistics for Small Areas
- Department of Energy & Climate Change, Energy Consumption data
- Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, Pay As You Earn and benefits data

The FRS was chosen as the main source for this study as it is the survey with the largest sample size that includes suitable questions on income.

The FRS allows four survey variables to be modelled. The estimates produced are values of average MSOA income for the following four income types:

- Total household weekly income (unequalised)
- Net household weekly income (unequalised)
- Net household weekly income before housing costs (equalised)
- Net household weekly income after housing costs (equalised)

Equalised income means that the household income values have been adjusted to take into consideration the household size and composition; it represents the income level of every individual in the household.

Equalisation is needed to make sensible income comparisons between households. For example, one household may have two adults and two children and have a total weekly household income of £300. If this is compared with a household containing just one adult who has a total weekly household income of £270, then although the first household has the higher total weekly income, it is the second that could be said to have the higher standard of living (assuming equal living and housing expenses).

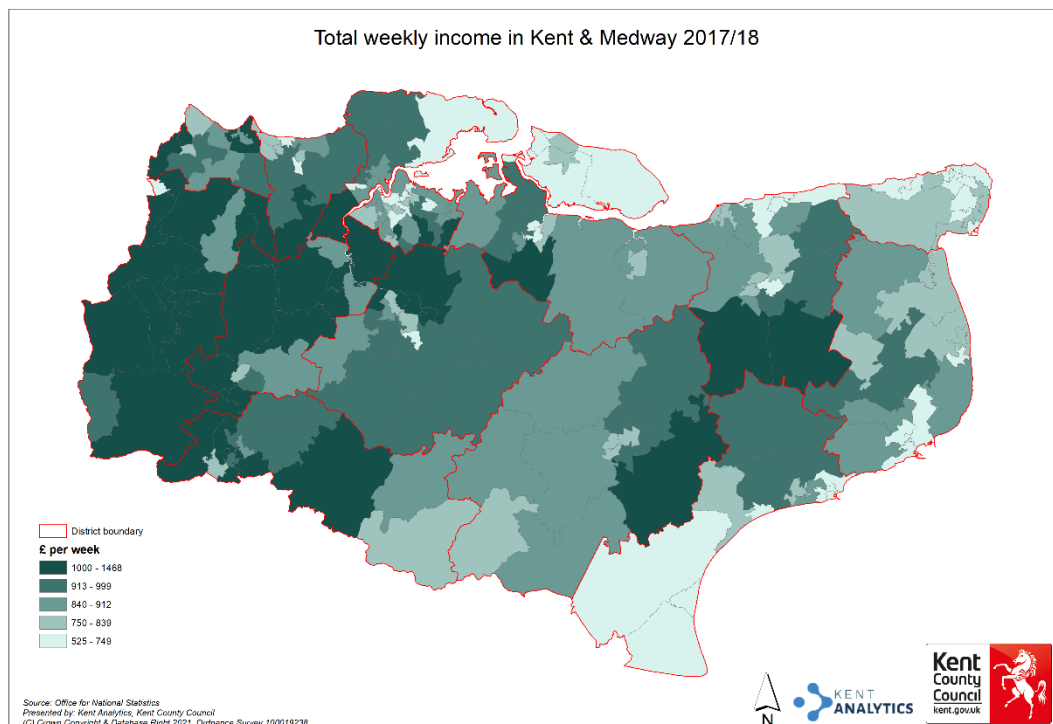
Total Household Income

Total household weekly income is the sum of the gross income of every member of the household plus any income from benefits such as Working Families Tax Credit. It is calculated as the sum of income from:

- wages and salaries (gross)
- self-employment
- investments
- tax credits
- state pension and income support/pension credit
- other pensions
- other benefits
- disability benefits
- other sources of income

The following map shows total income across Kent and Medway. Those areas with the highest incomes are largely concentrated in the west and through the centre of the county with some pockets of high income in Ashford, Canterbury and Swale. Eastern, coastal and areas along the Thames Estuary have some of the lowest incomes in Kent and Medway.

Map 1: Total household income in Kent & Medway



The following table shows the top five areas in Kent and Medway with the highest total household income and the bottom five with the lowest.

Since the creation of the MSOAs in 2004 Shepway District Council changed its name to Folkestone & Hythe but the names of the MSOAs are still labelled Shepway.

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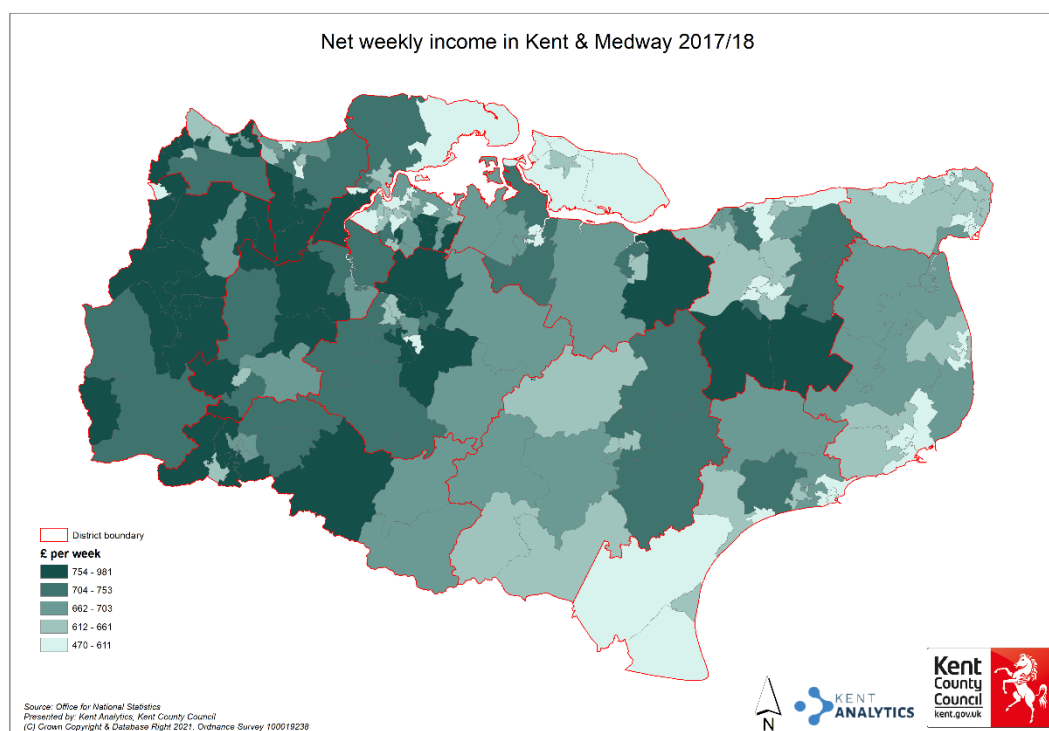
Net Weekly Income

Net household weekly income is the sum of the net income of every member of the household. It is calculated using the same components as total income but income is net of:

- income tax payments
- national insurance contributions
- domestic rates/council tax
- contributions to occupational pension schemes
- all maintenance and child support payments, which are deducted from the income of the person making the payments
- parental contribution to students living away from home.

The following map shows the net household income across Kent & Medway. Net incomes are higher on average in the west of the county with areas in the east and along the Kent coast being largely among the lowest. Dover, Folkestone & Hythe and Thanet have no areas within the top 20% with highest income. Thanet in particular has no area with average net income above £680 per week.

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Net Income Before Housing Costs

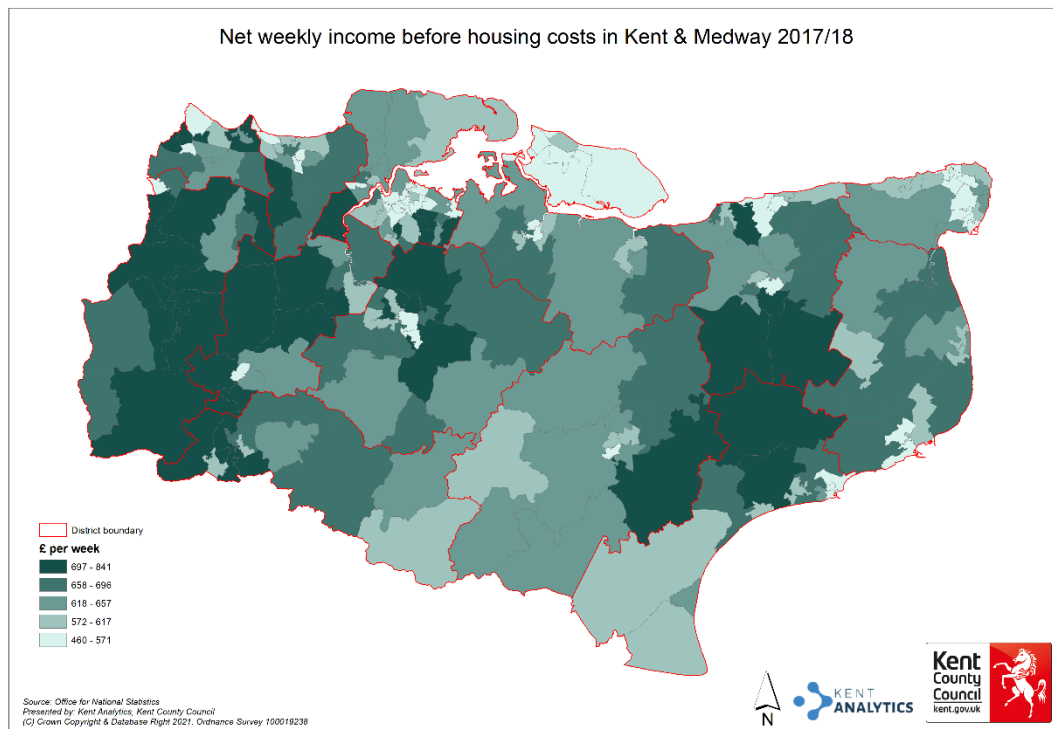
Net household weekly income before housing costs (equivalised) is composed of the same elements as net household weekly income but is subject to the equivalisation scale developed by the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD).

Equivalised income means that the household income values have been adjusted to take into consideration the household size and composition; it represents the income level of every individual in the household. Equivalisation is needed to make sensible income comparisons between households.

The following map shows the net household income before housing costs across Kent & Medway.

After being equivalised, household income before housing costs is more evenly spread across Kent and Medway, however there are still more areas in coastal districts with lower incomes. Thanet district has no areas with household income before housing costs above £644 per week.

Net Income After Housing Costs

Net household weekly income after housing costs (equivalised) is composed of the same elements of net household weekly income but is subject to the following deductions prior to the OECD's equivalisation scale being applied:

- rent (gross of housing benefit);
- water rates, community water charges and council water charges;
- mortgage interest payments (net of any tax relief);
- structural insurance premiums (for owner occupiers); and
- ground rent and service charges.

The following map shows the net household income after housing costs across Kent & Medway. Once housing costs are taken into account, those areas with highest income can be found largely in the west of the county. Lowest incomes are largely found in coastal areas with a few small pockets of low income around major urban areas in Ashford, Canterbury and Maidstone districts.

Table 4 shows the top five areas in Kent and Medway with the highest net household income after housing costs and the bottom five with the lowest.

Map 4: Net household income after housing costs (equivalised) in Kent & Medway

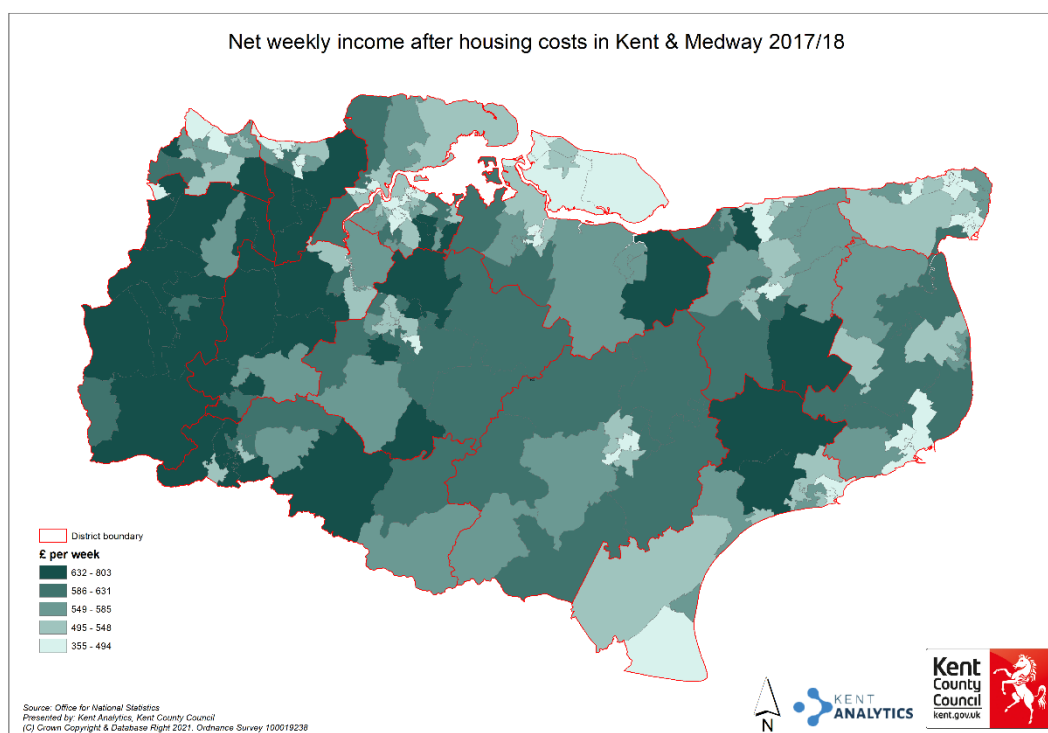
