Tesco Announces £5m in Funding for Schools Across the UK

From summer 2023, UK schools will be able to apply for a grant of up to £1,500 from Tesco to help give their pupils a healthier, more active, stronger start in life.

The new fund, which will replace the existing Tesco Community Grants programme, expects to support 5,300 schools in its first year through grants for nutritious food and sports play activities or outdoor equipment.

National Lottery Community Fund - New Strategy

The new strategy will cover the next seven years (2023 to 2030) with plans to invest more money in grassroots projects across the UK starting this year. At the core of the strategy are the following principles, which will guide funding decisions and ways of working:

- An equity-based approach to tackle inequality
- Supporting communities to build from their strengths
- Supporting what matters most to different communities

The new strategy will see an increase in funding:

- Awards for All the maximum grant is being raised from £10,000 to £20,000 covering two years (currently one year)
- A new £15 million programme is expected to open for applications 'around August' that will connect communities
- An additional £9 million will go to support the Climate Action Fund

Arts and Culture

Arts Council England National Lottery Projects Grants

Grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 are available for individual artists, community and cultural organisations to support arts, museums and libraries projects that engage people in England with arts and culture. Projects can range from directly creating and delivering creative and cultural activity to projects which have a longer term positive impact, such as organisational development, research and development and sector support and development. The funding is for projects that are focused on one or more of the following disciplines:

- Music
- Theatre
- Dance
- Visual arts
- Literature
- Combined arts including festivals and carnivals

Grants can support projects where the capital-specific expenditure in a project totals less than £100,000.

Deadline: None specified. Please note the current version of the National Lottery Projects Grants programme remains open for applications until the end of October 2023.

Arts Council England Projects Grants - Supporting Grassroots Live Music

Grants of up to £40,000 are available to grassroots music venues and promoters in England to present live music programming, and for activities that put them in a better position to deliver their work in the long term. Grants are for projects lasting up to a maximum of three years.

Help Musicians - Music-led Creative Collaboration

Grants of up to £5,000 are available for professional musicians in the UK to undertake a UK-based collaboration with other non-music artists (for example storytellers, lighting designers, choreographers, technologists, scientists, gaming designers, theatre directors, visual artists etc.). Eligible costs and activities include:

- Venue and rehearsal space.
- Recording costs (live or documentation but not studio recording)
- Travel and access, accommodation
- Fees for musicians, artists or collaborators' time to allow for collaboration
- Any other reasonable costs associated with creative collaboration

There should be an end result of the collaboration, such as a body of work created for an upcoming recording or a new performance, which ultimately, should push the boundaries of what the applicant does as a music creator.

Business and Employment

Kent Community Foundation - Employability, Skills and Enterprise

Grants of up to £5,000 (up to £7,500 may be considered for exceptional projects) are available for projects which raise the aspirations and increase the skills and opportunities of people who are far from the labour market. The theme supports projects working with young people/ NEETs, young parents, ex-offenders, ex-forces, those with financial barriers and those with learning disabilities, mental health issues or physical disabilities.

The Fund is looking for projects that provide accredited training, apprenticeships, meaningful work experience and life skills/employment skills workshops for the disadvantaged. It also supports strategic projects which aim to prevent young people from becoming NEETs.

Kent Social Enterprise Loan Fund (KSELF)

KSELF is a social lending programme, aiming to bridge the increasing funding gap for new and existing social enterprises in Kent and Medway, by offering unsecured loans of between £10,000 and £100,000. The financial package will include an element of up to 30% grant of the loan amount. The aim of the Fund is to spread the culture of social enterprise, break down the barriers which prevent enterprising social businesses from accessing finance and encourage a more enterprising approach to achieving positive change in our communities. Once finance is repaid, it will be re-loaned and re-invested back in the community. The fund is managed by the Kent Community Foundation.

Capify £40m SME Fund

The £40m SME Fund has been created to support established companies struggling with increasingly challenging economic conditions. Business owners can apply for between £5,000 and £500,000.

The fund has been specially created in response to growing concerns about access to finance from traditional lending sources and the impact that has on the ability of SMEs to deal with the effects of inflation.

The loan can be used for any business purpose, for example purchasing new stock, refurbishing business premises, buying a new piece of equipment, or to help with cash flow.

Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy -Start-up Loans

Loans of up to £25,000 are available to entrepreneurs in the UK wishing to start up a new business. The programme is designed to go some way to help solve the problem of supporting people who have a feasible business idea but no access to finance. The programme aims to equip enterprising individuals with the tools needed to make their businesses a success. Successful applicants will receive a low-cost unsecured loan, business mentoring and a range of business products.

To be eligible and apply for the scheme, applicants must be yet to start their business or have been trading for fewer than 36 months.

Get It Made - Women in Engineering Grant

A grant is available to a selected female led enterprise operating in the UK engineering sector to help the business scale up production and progress to the next level of development. The manufacturing grant consists of £5,000 that can be used when ordering any of Get it Made's manufacturing services. In addition, grantees will have direct access to Get It Made engineers who will help support their project from a Design for Manufacturing perspective.

Innovate UK - Smart Grants

UK registered organisations can apply for a share of up to £25 million to support business-focused, commercially viable R&D innovation that can significantly impact the UK economy.

The Smart Grants programme is a 'responsive' grant funding programme from Innovate UK (IUK). It has focused eligibility criteria and scope to support SMEs and their partners to develop disruptive innovations with significant potential for rapid, economic return to the UK. Applications can come from any area of technology and be applied to any part of the economy such as, but not exclusively, net zero, the arts, design and media. This competition is open to single applicants and collaborations.

IUK will fund innovative research and development (R&D) projects across a variety of technologies, markets and research categories, including feasibility projects, industrial research projects, and experimental development projects.

Innovate UK - Innovation Loans Future Economy Competition

Innovate UK (IUK) is offering loans to help micro, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) overcome barriers to their innovations becoming a successful, commercial reality. The aim is to make a considerable economic impact which results in significant, sustainable business growth. IUK has allocated up to £25 million to fund projects across four rounds of this competition. Loans of between £100,000 and £2 million are available, based on project proposals and IUK's judgement of the suitability and affordability of a loan for the business. IUK will fund experimental development projects that can include prototyping, demonstrating, piloting, testing and validation. Projects must focus on one or more of the following themes:

- Net Zero
- Health and wellbeing
- Next generation digital technologies
- Technology families

Community

Kent County Council – Combined Members Grants

Kent County Councillors (also known as Members) have £3,600 each to allocate as Grants. Members have supported a wide range of community initiatives, including:

- Local events and activities
- Purchase or repair of equipment and furniture
- Promotional materials and website creation/redesign
- Mentoring support to assist local groups to become more sustainable
- Sports projects
- Community safety schemes
- Small-scale pilot projects

Grants are available to properly-constituted organisations – such as voluntary and community groups, societies and charities, social enterprises and parish/town councils – for projects that benefit local communities. Members may jointly support a project where it benefits more than one area/community.

Kent County Council - Village and Community Hall Grant Scheme

Grants of up to £30,000 are available for local communities to improve an existing hall or build a new hall. A grant is conditional upon 50% match funding against eligible project costs. Projects supported by the scheme include:

- Building an extension
- New halls
- Upgrade of toilets
- Replacement windows and heating systems
- Improved insulation

The scheme is open to any village or community hall managed by an independent management committee.

FCC Community Action Fund

Grants of between £2,000 and £100,000 are available to not-for-profit organisations for amenity projects eligible under Object D of the Landfill Communities Fund (LCF). The funding is for projects sited within 10 miles of an eligible FCC Environment waste facility (in Kent, there are facilities located in Allington and Isle of Sheppey).

The funding can be used for the provision, maintenance or improvement of the following types of public amenity:

- Village halls and community centres
- Public play areas
- Publicly available Multi use games areas, skate parks and BMX tracks
- Sport and recreation grounds including pavilions and clubhouses with full public access
- Churches community spaces only
- Nature reserves
- Public gardens, parks, country parks, woodlands with dawn to dusk access
- Museums

The kinds of costs that may be included in the required funding are: contractors, materials, capital items, small items of equipment used by volunteers and staff to deliver the project.

Grants between £300 and £10,000 are available for charities, voluntary groups, schools and local authorities to carry out projects that will improve their local community. Funding is intended for projects that support communities to thrive by:

- Building strong relationships in and across communities
- Improving the places and spaces that matter to communities
- Helping more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage

Grants can be used for the following costs:

- The organisation's running costs
- Small land or refurbishment projects
- Equipment

National Lottery Community Fund - Reaching Communities

Large grants (over £10,000) are available to voluntary and community organisations in England for projects that make positive changes in their communities. The funding is intended for projects that support communities to thrive by:

- Building strong relationships in and across communities
- Improving the places and spaces that matter to communities
- Helping more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage

The grants can be used for the following costs:

- **Direct costs** associated with delivering activities in the community, including: project staff, materials, equipment, volunteer expenses, project evaluations
- **Organisational development**, including: business planning, testing new ways of working, staff training and development, developing governance and leadership, tech or IT upgrades/purchases, developing/sharing impact and learning, increasing capacity to support collaboration and partnership working
- **Core/fixed costs** to support the day-to-day running of the organisation, including: salaries, rent, utilities, equipment
- Purchasing, refurbishing or developing of land and buildings

Postcode Community Trust - Magic Little Grants Fund

Small one-off grants of up to £500 are available to small local charities and community groups for community projects that address themes set out by the funders. Projects should address one or more of the following themes:

- Improving mental wellbeing

- Preventing or reducing the impact of poverty
- Supporting marginalised groups and promoting equality

Veolia Environmental Trust

Grants of up to £75,000 are available for constituted, not-for-profit organisations and local authorities for projects that make improvements to community facilities and the natural environment that are located near a qualifying Veolia site in England. The Trust currently offers three grant schemes:

- Community Grants to create or improve community buildings or outside spaces for the benefit of the community
- Environmental Improvement Grants to enable landscape scale improvement projects such as habitat creation/management, and/or species protection
- Habitat and Biodiversity Grants to support structural improvements to a single habitat, such as a waterway, woodland, or nature reserve

Conservation and Environment

Kent Community Foundation - Environment

Grants of up to £5,000 (up to £7,500 may be considered for exceptional projects) are available to improve our local spaces and to encourage more sustainable ways of living. The fund wants to support projects that understand the link between poverty of life and poverty of environment and try to improve those communities most affected. These may include:

- Tree-planting and hedging regeneration
- Restoration of local habitats
- Organised litter-picking and beach cleans
- Community garden projects
- Educating children about local wildlife and nature

- Sustainable food education
- Greening community buildings

Countryside Stewardship: Woodland Management Plan Grant

Funding is available for farmers and other land managers in England to assist them in developing woodland management plans. The amount paid will be calculated on the entire area of woodland on a holding and can include up to 20% newly planted woodland (this means woodland that is under ten years old at the time of application).

Countryside Stewardship: Woodland Tree Health Grant

Funding is available to landowners in England for woodland tree health restoration projects. The scheme is intended to help create a range of environmental and social benefits that:

- Help protect and improve the resilience and environmental value of woodlands
- Restore woodland after damage by a tree disease of pest

Payments are subject to a cap that limits the amount that can be paid. The cap is based on the average grant per hectare and includes the cost of trees and additional capital items. The cap ranges from £1,750 to £3,500 per hectare and depends on if applicants are planting native or non-native trees and if the site is an ancient woodland.

Fisheries Improvement Programme (FIP)

Grants of up to £5,000 are available for angling clubs, non-government organisations, local authorities, commercial fisheries and landowners in England for

projects to improve habitat and facilities for anglers. The following are eligible for funding:

- Coarse, trout and eel habitat/passage: these are seen as the key constraints for good fish populations, therefore, addressing them will result in more sustainable stocks and improved connectivity
- Angling access and facilities: platforms, pegs and pathways for rivers and still waters. Ensuring the needs of less able-bodied anglers are considered
- Proactive management of prolonged dry weather and/or climate impacts. This may involve supporting fishery owners with supplementary aerators/WQ meters. Where possible work should contribute to carbon net zero targets

International Tree Foundation - UK Community Tree Planting Programme

Grants are available for community-based organisations to protect, promote and plant trees in local communities in the UK. Funding is for UK-based tree planting projects that meet the following essential criteria:

- Plant trees in public/publicly-accessible spaces: sites that are readily accessible to the public, including schools, parks, rights of way, and sites managed by community groups
- Plant indigenous tree species: this may include traditional fruit trees and 'honorary' natives where appropriate
- Engage community members in tree planting and enjoying the benefits of woodlands
- Have clear plans for maintenance and sustainability

Grants of up to £1,000 are available for projects of up to one year. This could be small community woodland, orchards, hedging projects, etc. Grants for large-scale projects ranging from 1,000 to 10,000 trees with a maximum price equivalent to ± 1.50 /tree (inclusive of tree protection).

In addition, the project must meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Engage children and young adults in tree planting and learning about trees
- Engage vulnerable groups and groups with low access to woodlands
- Conserve existing ancient trees and indigenous woodlands as well as new planting
- Create biodiversity habitats
- Conserve soil and water
- Demonstrate new approaches such as agroforestry
- Support rewilding and natural regeneration
- Support work/research on tree pest and disease resistance and climate change
- Support urban tree planting

National Garden Scheme - Community Gardens Award

Grants of between £500 and £5,000 are available to established community groups for the creation of a garden or a similar project (such as an allotment) with horticultural focus for the benefit of the local community. The project should bring people together and encourage sharing of gardening skills and knowledge. Grants could cover expenses such as:

- Site preparation (including hire of small mechanical tools such as rotavators)
- Hand tools and containers
- Plants, trees, shrubs
- Seating

National Lottery Community Fund - Climate Action Fund

Grants of up to £1.5 million over two to five years are available for community-led partnerships in the UK to make changes in their community that they believe will have the biggest impact on climate change. Projects are required to do at least one of the following:

- Encourage people and communities to use energy in an environmentally friendly way
- Bring communities together so that they can explore ways to promote energy efficiency
- Enable communities to understand and engage with opportunities for clean energy generation, which do not use fossil fuels

There is a particular focus on activities which engage with communities to:

- Educate, inspire, and start community-led energy action that leads to a reduction in carbon emissions over the long-term. This includes demonstration projects that people can visit in their community
- Build skills, tools, and resources to enable local action, such as, training community energy champion, exploring cost-effective easy to use solutions such as draft excluders or using LED bulbs
- Share skills with people in the community so they can get involved in projects where they can generate their own energy though renewables. We will not fund the purchase of solar panels, wind turbines or other generators of renewable energy. However, we can fund groups to engage with communities and help them build their understanding about community energy projects

• Use data to encourage action and positive behaviour change

The funding can be used for some capital costs. This could be for buying equipment or buying, leasing, refurbishing or developing land and buildings, or other construction-related work. However, the expectation is that most of the funding will go towards revenue costs (e.g. staff costs, project costs, engagement activities, utilities or running costs, management costs.

People's Postcode Lottery - Learning through Landscapes – Local School Nature Grants

An assortment of nature equipment up to the value of £500 and a two-hour training session are available to schools and early years providers. Nurseries, pre-schools, primary schools, and secondary schools are eligible to apply. Priority will be given to applicants that include children in the decision-making process. Eligible equipment includes:

- Woodland activity kits
- Growing kits
- Seed packs
- Gardening equipment
- Pollinator kits
- Solar light kits
- Wildlife watching kits
- Fireboxes

Save Our Wild Isles Community Fund (with Crowdfunding)

Grants of up to £15,000 are available for not-for-profit organisations in the UK who can raise their initial funding through a crowdfunding campaign for projects that protect and restore nature in their local communities. From 30 March 2023 until £1 million of funding has been allocated:

- Pledges will be matched at a rate of £2 to every £1 donated
- 2:1 match funding will apply to pledges of up to £250
- The maximum value of 2:1 match funding a project can receive is £15,000

The funding is for projects that demonstrate both of the following:

- It will support communities in areas where the need is greatest, specifically areas that are ranked 1-5 according to the Index of Multiple Deprivation
- It is working towards one of the following outcomes:
 - Nature restoration activity that boosts local biodiversity by protecting or restoring habitats, creating space for nature, connecting green spaces and/or addressing activities that directly impact biodiversity
 - Nature connectedness and pro-environmental behaviours action that supports greater connection to nature and promotes proenvironmental behaviours at the community level that will benefit nature
 - Community cohesion and connection nature positive activity that encourages collaboration in the local community by connecting people of diverse backgrounds, generations and abilities to nature and one another

Grants are available for registered Christian charities in the UK and Ireland to provide training, scholarships, and apprenticeships for individuals in heritage skills that are essential for the preservation and maintenance of historic Christian buildings, including:

- Equipment purchases, including tools, bikes, bike parking, locks, helmets, high-vis jackets and pumps (must not exceed 5% of the total grant funding awarded)
- Equipment hire, such as cones, high-vis jackets, helmets or bikes
- Consumables, including brake pads, inner tubes, cables, lubricant or small parts
- Venue hire or location fees
- Participant incentives, but not giveaways
- Participant refreshments such as reasonable drinks and snacks
- Promotion costs (must not exceed 7% of your total grant funding)
- Transport, including transportation of goods to and from the event location (must not exceed 5% of the total grant funding awarded)
- Personal Protection Equipment such as hand sanitiser, face masks, disposable gloves, or paper tissue

Funding is available for critical household items as follows:

- Electric cookers
- Furniture, kitchen equipment and small appliances.

- Fridges and freezers
- Washing machines
- Tumble dryers
- Children's beds and bedding, including cots

Applications must be made through an organisation that is supporting the family or young person and is capable of assessing their needs, and that can also administer the grant. The scheme is delivered by Family Fund Business Services
