What will I be expected to do?

Support Community Wardens by identifying issues and feeding back to relevant services including Trading Standards and the Police.

Liaise with organisations including Neighbourhood Watch, Victim Support and the Fire and Rescue Service.

Attend local groups and meetings providing advice on topical issues and provide local residents with crime prevention materials to reduce their fear of crime.



Training will be provided as well as ongoing mentoring with a Community Warden.

As a volunteer you will not have accredited powers or be expected to handle sensitive information.

How much time will I be expected to give?

Just 20 hours a month but you can do more if you want.



Expenses / Car / Internet

Uniform will be provided and your mileage and travel expenses will be covered. We will require a criminal record check (DBS). You will not be required to pay for any of this.

You do not necessarily need a driving licence for the role. However you will need to have access to the internet to enable you to receive messages.
