Re: Kiln Court

We are writing to share KCC's plans for Kiln Court.

We would like to apologise for not being able to do so before now but on-going legal and funding discussions between KCC and Central Government means there is limited information to be shared at this point. Nonetheless, we wish to share with you now, what we can, and we will keep you updated as much as we are able.

In July, the High Court ruled Kent County Council (KCC) must take "every possible step" to increase its capacity to accommodate and look after all unaccompanied asylum-seeking (UAS) children arriving in the county. The legal process is ongoing, as are the funding discussions with Central Government.

KCC must comply with the Court ruling. As a result, KCC is required to identify accommodation which can be utilised to support UAS children at pace.

Kiln Court is selected as one of the properties to support the service for the following reasons:

- Internal spaces are already configured in a layout to provide homely and appropriate accommodation for children, as is required by Ofsted regulations
- It is located in an area where children can temporarily reside to develop early skills in acclimatising to community norms and socialising.
- The layout and location are similar to KCC's existing Reception Centres which for many years successfully provided temporary accommodation for UAS children before they move to other Local Authorities under the National Transfer Scheme (NTS).
- The property already has the appropriate planning permission in line with the intended use and the proposed works.

We have recently commenced some early enabling works at Kiln Court to help ensure we are able to open the accommodation prior to UAS children arriving in the spring/summer period. As a result, you will start to see increased activity at the site.

## **Reception Centre Management**

Kiln Court will have KCC staff and security on site 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Kiln Court will be registered with Ofsted, operate to its regulatory standards and be subject to regular inspections. The centre will be a temporary home for UAS children, aged 16 and 17. Current plans suggest that the facility will provide 32 places.

Kiln Court will be managed in the same way as KCC's two existing reception centres, one of which is based in a similar residential area to Kiln Court, close to local schools and

community services. These centres are operating well and have been for many years, providing temporary homes for UAS children while they await transfer to other local authorities under the National Transfer Scheme (NTS). The required timescale for a UAS child to transfer from KCC care to another local authority under the NTS is 10 working days.

UAS children accommodated at Kiln Court will be Children in Care to KCC, as required under legislation. This means each child will have an allocated social worker regularly visiting them and leading a plan for their care. Each child will have an allocated Independent Reviewing Officer (IRO) to ensure this plan is satisfactorily completed. Therefore, social workers will be at Kiln Court alongside dedicated management staff and security.

KCC dedicated managers and staff at Kiln Court will be responsible for meeting the children's basic care needs, providing a structured program of weekly education and activities and setting rewards and sanctions for behaviour. As the children will only be at the centre for a short period of time their education will be delivered on-site. This includes English language lessons and guidance on English law and society, thereby supporting the children to develop early skills to socialise whilst having the best and earliest opportunity to contribute towards their community, wherever that may be in the UK. This helps UAS children successfully integrate, whilst temporarily at Kiln Court and when they move to their more permanent home in other local authority areas.

Kiln Court has an outdoor recreation area the children will use and KCC staff will accompany them on organised activities off site. There will be times when the children can independently leave the centre for short periods of time, for example, to go to a local shop or park. It will only be allowed with the agreement of staff about where they will be and when they will return. Children will be asked to return by early evening. If a child does not return and cannot be located by 10:00pm, KCC staff will report them missing to Kent Police. This will instigate a multi-agency response to locate them.

Generally, children are extremely grateful for the accommodation and support they receive from KCC and are eager to learn about, integrate and contribute to UK society. The UAS children are continuing to provide strong contributions to their local community which are valued.

## Construction

Building works are expected to be taking place on site until July 2024. The works will involve the refurbishment of the building for this use.

We continue to work closely with our contractors to ensure we minimise noise and disruption to the local residents. For example, deliveries will be taking place outside of school drop off and pick up periods to prevent unnecessary congestion.
